oronto, the capital of the province of Oning in the city that day could have imagined the tario, is a major Canadian city along Lake Ontario's northwestern shore. It's a dynamic metropolis with a core of soaring skyscrapers, all dwarfed by the iconic, free-standing CN Tower. Toronto also has many green spaces, from the orderly oval of Queen's Park to 400-acre High Park and its trails, sports facilities and zoo.

On July 1, 1867, Torontonians gathered near St. Lawrence Market to celebrate Canada's Confederation with a day-long ox roast, followed by evening festivities and fireworks in Queen's Park. Few of the over 45,000 people resid-



roles Toronto would play within Canada over the next 150 years. The road to becoming Canada's centre of arts and entertainment, business, sports and innovation started with a rejection from Queen Victoria. While she chose Ottawa as Canada's capital due to its distance

between Montreal and Toronto and lower likelihood of attack from the United States, our consolation prize was to play host to the new Ontario provincial government.

The Hockey Hall of Fame

The Toronto Eaton Centre is a shopping mall and office complex in Downtown Toronto, Ontario, Canada.


It is owned and managed by Cadillac Fairview. It was named after the Eaton's department store chain that became defunct in the late 1990s.
